

A PERFECT MATCH

Though modest in size, Age Exchange more than make up for it with their spirit and enthusiasm for changing lives through arts, reminiscence and intergenerational activities.

Mark Adams, Chief Executive of Community Integrated Care, tells us about his ambitions for our merger with Age Exchange: "We've been inspired by the impact that their life-enhancing work has had on the people in its care and in the wider local community. Coming together with Age Exchange represents a fantastic start to our

bold new five-year strategy. We hope it is the first partnership of many, as we help more charities increase the reach of their incredible work."

Age Exchange's Chief Executive, Rebecca Packwood, oversaw the merger between the two charities: "We set out to find a national partner that provided both the infrastructure we needed to grow and synergy in terms of values and ambition - Community Integrated Care was the perfect match."



CHANGING LIVES THROUGH ARTS

In early 2019, Age Exchange was awarded a grant from the 'Building Connections Fund', a partnership between the Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport, The National Lottery Community Fund and the Co-op Foundation, which aims to tackle loneliness and isolation in response to the findings of the Jo Cox Commission.

The funding was awarded to Age Exchange to operate a new pioneering service at our EachStep Blackley care home, transforming the lives of people with dementia. Having launched in March 2019, this is the first development from the partnership between the two charities, providing award-winning support in the heart of the North Manchester community.

A VISION FOR THE FUTURE

October 2019 saw a huge step forward in the partnership, with a high-profile event taking place at the House of Lords. The evening showcased the vision for Age Exchange to an audience of philanthropists, stakeholders and industry leaders from a variety of sectors.

Speaking at the event Mark Adams, said: "I'm proud to see such a cross section of

organisations, all coming together in support of our vision for a network of Age Exchange hubs that really have the potential to change society at scale. Each hub will deliver vital support in the heart of the community, enabling people with dementia to stay at home for longer, improve wellbeing, and reduce the need for residential care."

She continued, "The team at Charnwood Lodge have an unwavering commitment to the people we support. Every single person has consistently worked to improve the activities and opportunities we offer, so that the people we support lead lives that are as full as possible."

TRANSFORMING LIVES

In August 2019, we were delighted to open Half-Field Close, a service in Gateshead which is transforming the lives of four people with learning disabilities.

Two of the people we support at Half-Field Close, Jess and Ann, are living independently for the first time. Half-Field Close's modernised and adapted

bungalows feature high-tech security systems, an enchanting, therapeutic garden space and beautiful living areas, so that Jess and Ann can lead the fullest lives possible. Marc Brodie, Managing Director of the North East, told us: "We're incredibly proud to open Half-Field Close and to have been involved in this development in partnership with Gateshead Council.

The service really is at the forefront of assistive technologies and we're delighted to be supporting people with care needs to become more independent."

Ann, 36, has autism and had previously lived with her mother on weekends and at a respite service during the week. Her mother said: "Half-Field Close is like winning the lottery as I now know my daughter is safe and can be supported independently with her own team." HALF-FIELD CLOSE IS LIKE WINNING THE LOTTERY AS I NOW KNOW MY DAUGHTER IS SAFE AND CAN BE SUPPORTED INDEPENDENTLY WITH HER OWN TEAM.

Sarah Adams, Service Leader at Half-Field Close explained the preparation that goes into supporting people into their first independent living environment: "We've been working closely with Ann, Jess and their families to ensure they are ready for the transition." She continued, "Both of them have been fully involved in the development of support plans and interviewing a selection of the staff team. They know each other from their day services so can't wait to start having BBQs in their glorious garden and parties on the patio!"





Our Head of Continuous Improvement, Graeme McConnell, shares a bold vision for our Quality Advisors: "Everything we want to achieve relies on us delivering a really high standard of care and support – and that's why our Quality Advisors are so important to everything we do.



As part of FACT's 'The Future World of Work' programme, the project aimed to bring together creative and research organisations to explore the potential for innovation, change and development in major industries within the Liverpool City Region.

The research programme culminated in a unique dramatic production, 'A Night of Social Care Improv', which explored opportunities and challenges for the future, reflecting the tipping point that our sector faces right now and the era of uncertainty that follows.

The production was an improvised performance which saw people with lived experience of receiving care and support take to the stage, with role play being used to unveil hypothetical futures for work in learning disability and mental health support. The sold-out event shared valuable insight and created a much-needed discussion on key issues for the sector including technology, funding, community engagement and human rights.

Working together with international artist, Hwa Young, the production was developed during a three-month residency, which saw the artist spend time in our specialist services, alongside the people we support, their families and our colleagues.

Martin McGuigan, Executive Director of Innovation and Managing Director for South-Central at Community Integrated Care, said: "The social care sector plays a vital role in society today, so it is important that we can explore how it might change, develop and innovate in the years ahead. It has been an exciting opportunity to have an artist spend time with people at all levels of our organisation to review how they perceive both the challenges and opportunities for the future, and to bring this insight to life in such a creative way."

He continues, "This innovative production was engaging, entertaining and inclusive, and gave the audience a clear sense



of the value of high-quality, person-centred care. We were delighted to bring together a diverse range of thought-leaders from across the care, political and cultural sectors, as well as members of the public, to help inspire positive change."

Artist, Hwa Young, explained the success of the performance which took place in FACT: "Through the production, I wanted to shine a light on the social care sector. which is often overlooked. We achieved that with this performance. Winners of the We Care Fund in Abshot Road, Hampshire have put their £250 grant to excellent use by building their very own, very creative sensory room!




